This means setting up a comprehensive safety induction for new workers, delivering targeted training for specific tasks, and following up regularly to keep safety top of mind.

Remember, staying compliant with safety regulations might seem challenging, but it's essential. It starts with keeping up-to-date with safety matters, understanding the risks unique to your operations, and ensuring you have the right resources and processes in place to manage these risks effectively.

Make sure your business has solid procedures for reporting and responding to incidents, hazards, and risks, and regularly check that these procedures are being followed.
